## ART, ECOLOGY AND THE POLITICS OF CHANGE

The Sharjah Biennial 8 (SB8) proposes art as a way of creating a better understanding about our relationship with nature and the environment, whilst considering its social, political and cultural dimensions in an interdisciplinary way. Aware of the critical ambiguity of its topic and its potentially controversial dimension, SB8 sets out to explore the renewed role of contemporary art as a vanguard force, which could invoke active dialogues about possible future sustainable scenarios. SB8 presents various attempts in visual art, performance and film that address the growing social, political and environmental challenges that the world is facing due to excessive urban development, pollution, political ambition, and the thoughtless misuse, abuse and exhaustion of our natural resources. SB8 is not only a platform for presentations, exhibitions and discussions related to these issues. but it has also taken an active role in commissioning artists to produce new work addressing the topic at hand, while partnering with various organisations to stimulate wider involvement with these concerns, particularly amongst educational institutions. The biennial attempts to contaminate rather than insulate and to merge together art, society, and environmental issues, in order to implicate all sectors of society into questioning our social, political, and ecological praxis.

The SB8 programme includes exhibitions, performances, a film programme curated by Mark Nash and a symposium organised in collaboration with the American University of Sharjah, RSA (London) and curatorial practice Latitudes (Barcelona). The entire city of Sharjah was offered to more than 80 international artists for sitespecific work. The Biennial's activities and events take place across a wide range of venues including the Sharjah Art Museum, the Expo Centre, the Heritage Area of Sharjah, and several outdoor urban and natural sites. The Sharjah Biennial Art Prizes will be awarded to two winning artists by a jury composed of Negar Azimi, Charles Esche and Geeta Kapur. Furthermore, UNESCO will award their Prize for the Promotion of the Arts & the Young Digital Creator Award, in collaboration with the Sharjah Biennial 8. Within the framework of the cooperation between UNESCO and the Sharjah Biennial, an international educators' workshop will take place at the College of Fine Art & Design, University of Sharjah.

## **VENUES**

#### SHARJAH ART MUSEUM

Sharjah Art Museum which comprises a total area of 5,200 m² and is part of the Sharjah Art Area is situated in the historical section of the city. The Museum was launched in 1995, and has since hosted hundreds of projects and exhibitions, including the Sharjah Biennial and the Sharjah International Arabic Calligraphy Biennial.

Its art collection includes works from 18th century orientalists to contemporary Arabic and international artists. The Museum has a publishing programme, two art libraries, a cafeteria and a shop.

#### **EXPO CENTRE SHARJAH**

Was established in 1977, and was taken over by the Sharjah Chamber of Commerce and Industry in 1991. Located on the road linking Sharjah to Dubai, the Expo Centre hosts over 20 exhibitions per year including country-specific and specialised international trade fairs.

The hall which will house part of the Sharjah Biennial exhibition is a flexible space of approximately 4,000m<sup>2</sup>. In addition, several installations will be positioned outside the Expo Centre.

#### **QANAT AL QASBA (QAQ)**

Key tourist, cultural and entertainment destination in Sharjah. QAQ comprises of a water canal, three pedestrian bridges and a number of restaurants and cafés, in addition to many outlets built in a mixture of oriental and contemporary European architecture. Located at the center of QAQ is the 300-seat theatre, Masrah Al Qasba, with a regular programme of performances. In addition, QAQ includes an exhibition area where various cultural and educational local and international activities are held.

#### HERITAGE AREA

A recently renovated complex of historical buildings in the local style of architecture, housing several archaeological and ethnographic museums in addition to centres for crafts and theatre and the headquarters of the Emirates Fine Arts Society. Several artists will present new work commissioned by the Sharjah Biennial 8, and specifically created for this area.

#### KHALID LAGOON

Artificial lagoon located in the centre of the city, and which will play host to an installation on a small island in the middle of it. Audiences will be able to access the island by boat.

Other venues also extend to various outdoor spaces and locations such as a school, and outdoor urban and natural sites.

#### **FILM SYNOPSIS**

#### Riverglass - A River Ballet in Four Seasons, 1997 - Andrej Zdravi - 40 min.

Riverglass is a 41-minute video that visually immerses viewers into the emerald waters of the Stocha River in Slovenia. The demands that the video's length and approach ask of viewers transform their awareness and experience of the natural world.

Riverglass opens up a space in which they might meditate on their relationship to the natural world and how that world has come to function in representation, and in reality.

#### Char Adhyay, 1997 Kumar Shahani - 110min.

Kumar Shahani is one of the foremost experimental Indian filmmakers. In broad terms he reworks the materials and concerns of the neorealist (Satyajit Ray) and Marxist (Rhitvik Ghatak) cinema traditions in India with a minimal approach of stunning visual beauty. He was the subject of a retrospective at the 2006 Asia Pacific Triennial in Brisbane. Based on the Rabindrath Tagore story of the same name, Char Adhay takes as point of departure the figure of a woman who has become drawn into the terrorist wing of the Indian independence movement. Its rigorous and sumptuous aesthetics pose important questions of the connection between aesthetics and politics.

#### Darwin's Nightmare, 2004 Hubert Sauper - 107min.

This film uses the form of the investigative documentary to expose the destruction of the natural and human ecosystems caused by the introduction of the Nile Perch into Lake Victoria. An economy is created which links the factory processing

of this fish both with arms-smuggling and European aid while at the same time generating a downward spiral in the living conditions of those attracted to the region for work.

# The Journals of Knud Rasmussen, 2006 - Igloolik Isuma / Zacharias Kunuk, and Norman Cohn - 112min.

This the second feature film from the Inuit production company Igloolik Isuma. Their historical reconstruction series Nunavut our Land was shown in Documenta11. The Journals... is a fiction film which follows the destructive conversion of Inuit communities from Shamanism to Christianity in the Canadian Arctic in the 1920s (at the time when Robert Flaherty was creating his fantasy of inuit life Nanook of the North (1922)). For us in Sharjah this is a preeminent example of first nations filmmaking, working with local communities and producing work for that local as well as an international community. As well as reflecting therefore on the tragic history of crusading Christianity which often accompanied colonialism it is also about how political and social change can be developed through art and culture, through the process of collective, locally based film production.

#### The Form of the palace of Matsumaekun's Brothers 1, 1988 Oki Hiroyuki - 17 min.

The series originated with the work, "The Diary of Matsumae-kun" (1988). This work, a city plan for Matsumae-city in Hokkaido, was submitted as Hiroyuki Oki's graduation project while studying architecture in college. In addition to the architectural draft, the design was displayed alongside various media, presenting the landscape in a manga-

like panel layout from the point of view of the fictional character "Matsumae-kun". The following year, the inaugural film "A Film of Matsumae-kun" (1989) was created. The early works in the series were captured on film in the form of a diary beginning on New Year's Day. It was marked by in-camera edits, creating a very physical sense of improvisation. The annual series was interrupted in 1996, but recommenced in 2002 with "Vision for Matsumae-kun's Death". These newer works reflect changes in progress, such as a shift to the use of video cameras, and bringing the actors to Matsumae-city for shootings. In terms of editing, material from previous series was incorporated to expand the films, giving them different forms than of those in the past. The filming for "The Form of the Palace of Matsumae-kun's Brothers 1", 13th in the series, took place over one month beginning January 22, 2006, and featured settings in Hakodate, Sapporo, Tokyo and Kochi in addition to Matsumae-city.

#### 800 meters under, Aboveground-Underground, 2005 Yang Shaobin - 14 min.

The film is composed of two poles of the life of a coalminer, the depths of the coalmines and their communities and dwellings. "Underground" focuses on the process of production of the coalmines, while "Aboveground" presents a haunting look on the lives of coal miners once above the surface of the earth, a life which is still enshrouded in darkness, absent the possibilities of escape. Through personal experience and travel, the artist sensitively engages with the complexity of issues, revealing the humanity within this cycle of production. This is both a historical and prescient

issue concerning political organization, rapid shift in social system, survival, and power. The project re-examines the history of industrialization & urban spaces, socialist memory & their connection to contemporary Chinese art history.

#### Lagos Wide and Close, 2002 Bregtje van der Haak - 60 min.

This film is based on research by the Harvard Project on Lagos City under the direction of Rem Koolhaas, Lagos is home to an estimated fifteen million people. Despite crime, drainage problems, relentless traffic jams, water and electricity shortages, Lagos is growing so quickly that by 2020 it is expected to be the world's third largest city. Architect Rem Koolhaas decided to study Lagos in order to understand what makes a dysfunctional city function. Loosely based on the trajectories of a bus driver, this film gives us a glimpse into the lives of eight Lagos inhabitants and the creative relationships they have developed with their complex city. Koolhaas adds his reactions and interpretations of five years of research on Lagos. Filming has long been prohibited in Nigeria so very few images of Lagos exist. This film separates the distant (wide) and intimate (close) views of the city allowing the viewer to switch between these perspectives interactively. There are also three different audio-tracks - commentary with Rem Koolhaas, talks with inhabitants and sounds of the city.


#### Fantôme Afrique, 2005 Isaac Julien - 17min.

Fantôme Afrique weaves cinematic and architectural references through the rich imagery of urban Ouagadougou, the centre for cinema in Africa, and the arid spaces of rural Burkina Faso, and is punctuated by archival footage from early colonial expeditions and landmark moments in African history. Renowned choreographer and dancer Stephen/ Galloway (Ballet Frankfurt) and actor Vanessa Myrie (Baltimore) figure as 'trickster/phantom' and 'witness' in this carefully composed meditation on the denationalized, de-territorialized spaces born of the encounters between local and global cultures, where the ghosts of history linger amid the realities of the day.




